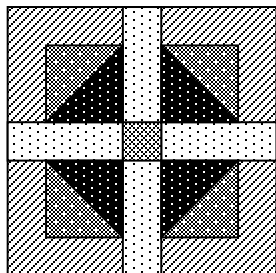

TREASURERS REPORT

CCQG, Meeting Minutes **MAY 19, 2025**

Program: Trash to Treasure. Mary Alice Hart visited our quilt guild to hold a workshop and share her expertise on how to turn fabric stash and scraps into beautiful projects. Mary Alice recounted memories of her Grandmother and her home. Her Grandmother, Mother and Aunt all sewed. She said her first shopping trip was to the local feed store where she climbed over the bags of chicken feed until she found the perfect fabric for her first project which was a skirt with elastic waist. She said scrap quilting started as a necessity and has now turned into an art form.

She showed some quilts she has made. Her first quilts were made with scraps and strip sets. She then used orphan blocks for quilts and made crumb quilts. She also showed that they could be used to make potholders, hot dish pad and place mats. She also discussed her lessons learned along the way.

This was a very pleasant program and the workshop was enjoyable.

Rhonda Streich discussed the mystery quilt explaining that it required 2 fabrics and the colors must contrast. She handed out the directions with fabric requirements and instructions for the first clue.

The meeting was called to order by President Jennifer Newcomer at 8:17 pm. There were 30 members present. We had 2 guests, Deyonne and Kathryn Evans. Drawing winners: Name Tag: Jan Franks Show and Tell: Kim Meyer Flowers from

refreshment table decoration: Dawn Vehmeier and Kathryn Evans.

Kathy Clark made a motion to accept the minutes in the May newsletter and Chyree Rhode Lincoln seconded. Motion passed.

The Treasurer's Report as it appeared in the May newsletter was reviewed and will be held for audit by the Executive Board.

Programs: Kay Walker reported that the program for next month will be on Longarm Quilting. Donalee Yenney, Carol Bellows and Ruth Whitney will be talking all things longarm.

Kay also stated that she is ready to step down as Program Chairperson after 2025 but is willing to help someone new as they take over in 2026.

Quilt Show Update: Please take a survey so we can improve on the next quilt show! The profit from the quilt show was \$4524.18. The profit from the raffle quilt was \$1581.

Service projects: Doreen Hartman and Nina Mueller reported on some ideas they have been working on. Doreen spoke on doing several hands-on workshops teaching kids how to make a pillowcase. They also talked about making walker bags and bags for shoe boxes. Ruth talked about making a reading pillow (book pillow) for kids for Christmas in place of the gift exchange between members. A facility that will take and use these needs to be identified.

Storage unit: Discussion took place on how the guild is going to pay for the storage unit we are using to store the quilt racks. The fee is \$40/month. Sandy Sheely shared a couple of ideas. One is to enter a quilt in the Ogle County fair that was finished this year and to donate the winnings. Another idea is to have a Quilt Guild booth at the fair where we

could sell leftover boutique items. Yet another idea is to have a rummage sale. Chyree Rohde-Lincoln mentioned that we could all take turns sponsoring a month.

Rhonda Streich talked about selling the homemade trailer we had been using for storage in her barn and use the proceeds to help pay the storage fee. Additionally, we would be able to save the \$200 out of the budget that was allocated for registration and maintenance of the trailer and apply it toward the storage fee.

All options will be considered by the Executive Board, which will then make a recommendation to the membership on how to cover this new expense.

Ruth Whitney made a motion to approve the 2025 Budget with the amendment to change the line item for the trailer registration and maintenance to list the storage unit rental for that \$200, to approve the sale of the trailer, and to correct the Note on line item for Quilt Show to read "reinstate in 2028". Donalee Yenney seconded. Motion passed.

New Business: Barb Wells received a \$200 donation for the Quilt Guild in memory of Donna Dietrich. A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Nina Mueller and seconded by Shauna Heck. Meeting adjourned at 8:53.

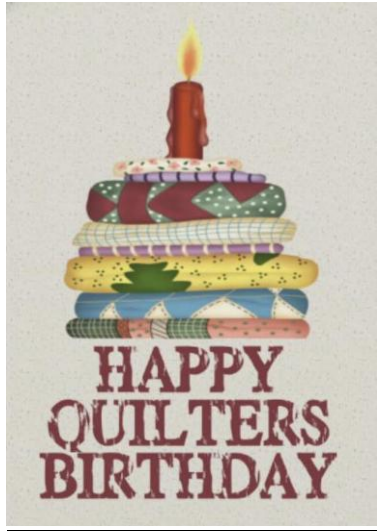
MYSTERY QUILT
